### **Inside Looking Out**

"I am the church! You are the church! We are the church together! All who follow Jesus, all around the world, yes, we're the church together!"

Way back when my kids were little and I taught Sunday School and Vacation Bible School, I'd often teach this song—usually belting it out with big arm motions to illustrate I am, you are, we are the church with a circle as wide as we

could stretch our arms to show how the church that we're a part of spans this whole wide world.

When I preach at churches on Sunday mornings, the first thing I do is bring greetings from our congregations and the brothers and sisters at MCIJ, MCTC, MCIW and CMCF. That's important because we are a sibling congregation with every other Lutheran congregation, but you can't see us because we exist behind the walls of prisons.

One evening before worship at CMCF, we were talking about how, unlike other "prison ministries" that minister *to* those incarcerated, we are a congregation that ministers *with*, and worships together.

The conversation began with one of the men asking me "Where is your church?" I answered, "Right here." He asked again, "I mean where is your church—your *real* church out there?" and I answered again, "Right here! This is my real church!"

We talked about how the CSD is a Lutheran congregation with four sites, and all of us are part of that congregation that exists only inside the walls of prison. One of the men, who had been transferred from MCTC and had been a faithful worshiper there as well, exclaimed with a broad smile, "So I'm still in the same congregation as my buddies at MCTC!"

What a wonderful realization of what the Body of Christ is all about, the connection we have as Christians and in particular as Lutherans: wherever we are, whoever we are, whatever our past, all of us saints and sinners, all around the world, have a place and an essential part to play in that Body.

If you sang "We Are the Church" as a kid or teacher like me, you'll recall that one of the verses goes,

"The church is not a building, The church is not a steeple, The church is not a resting place, The church is a people!"

Just as buildings, steeples and resting places don't define our churches, neither do the walls that our CSD members live behind. We are defined by the love of Christ. Inside the walls and outside the walls, we are the church together!

#### **Re-Entry Workshop**

On the evening of August 22, we were exceptionally blessed to have several synod representatives with experience in re-entry and aftercare of returning citizens hold a workshop for us. They were in town for the Congregational Vitality Conference, and graciously came to speak with us at Salem Lutheran Church in Catonsville. There was a good turnout of CSD volunteers who have a heart for helping our members transition to the outside world when they are released and a spirited conversation.

This was a timely and important event for us at CSD as we endeavor to offer our members what we as a Lutheran congregation can uniquely provide: a connection to congregations on the "outside" who can give the same sense of community that our members have while they are part of the CSD on the "inside."

The take away from this workshop is "**love them**." While we discussed the various issues congregations can experience welcoming returning citizens and the importance for congregations to place appropriate boundaries as needed for the well-being of both the congregation and the returning citizen, the overriding principle is "**love them**," and obey Jesus' mandate to welcome. The synod representatives, some of whom had experienced this welcome themselves as returning citizens after incarceration, attested to the power of being welcomed into congregations when they needed it most.

#### Interfaith Service at CMCF

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On August 24, the Community of St Dysmas hosted an event that would be extraordinary anywhere on this planet, but particularly so inside a prison: an interfaith worship that included Christians, Jews, Muslims, Native American spirituality, and others.

It began when one of our volunteers had last minute car trouble a couple months ago and wasn't able to get to worship at CMCF. The chaplain, Rabbi Tobesman, stayed with the CSD men who had gathered and led a discussion. Eventually the conversation turned to how the Holocaust relates to religious intolerance in the world today. It was the CSD men who decided that something should be done to bring people together and began talking about an interfaith worship service.



Chaplain Tobesman and I met a couple times to plan, but it was the men themselves who made the service happen. We used quotes from Jewish, Catholic and Lutheran sources to create a dialogue about the events of the Holocaust and considered how hatred could lead to something like that happening again. We shared scriptures from different faiths, prayed, and sang together. At the end, we invited any faith represented to share a blessing, and we heard words of benediction in several different traditions.

We could measure the interest in this event by the number of chairs we set up. Initially we set up about 25, but as the men kept coming we set up more and more. We lost track of how many men, from so many faiths, came to be in solidarity with their brothers.

What a picture of the kingdom of God—all God's children at peace with each other in the most unlikely of places! This is the second interfaith service that has taken place organized by the CSD with the help of Chaplain Tobesman, and the men expressed the desire to do this on a regular basis. Praise the God who goes by many names and blesses all those who honor that name!
